



Homework: Making Your Language Plan

Make a language plan for your family! Discuss together with your spouse how you could best support the language development of your child. Part 1: Questions for discussion

- Which languages should you speak to your child and why? If you have to make a choice between your own mother tongues, explain the reasons why you choose one over another?
- Which language/languages are you going to speak to each other and why? Should you make any changes now because you are going to have a child?
- Which one of the languages the child will need more support with? How can you offer it?
- The language/languages of a child start to develop long before she/he can actually understand or produce it herself/himself. How can you support the language development of your baby from day one?
- Which languages is your child going to learn later on (in school for example)?
- What kind of attitudes do your parents and other relatives have towards bilingualism/ monolingualism? Can you affect them, and if yes, how?
